
Clarke's the man of the weekend



King of the Castle - Graham Clarke

IN last weekend's Easter Athletics Festival Graham Clarke of the Manx Athletic Club created athletics history when he became the first local athlete to win the 'Man of the Festival' award, in the 26-year history of the event.

He achieved this honour by retaining his title in Saturday's Peel Hill Race; finishing second in the Good Friday Road Race around the streets of Douglas; and clocking the third-fastest time in Sunday's Festival Relay, on Douglas Promenade.

Clarke's Double

Conditions were damp and cold when the action moved to Peel on Easter Saturday for a series of Hill Races, and the question on everyone's lips was "Will Graham Clarke repeat his victory of last year?"

This question was answered in less than 21 minutes when Graham stormed home to score a great victory over Scottish Inter national Bobby Quinn, but it was only in the final quarter-mile that he managed to break clear of his rival to snatch victory by just three seconds.

In the team race, victory went to Salford Harriers who scored 32 points, just two points clear of the defending champions, the Manx Athletic Club.

With Lynne McIntyre deciding to miss this event, it was Lucy Elliot of Liverpool University who took charge of the proceedings and pulled clear to score a great victory by fifty seconds over Stephanie Quirk, who had a comfortable margin of 27 seconds over third finisher Ruth Isaacs.

John Cookson of East Cheshire Harriers made it two

wins in two-days with a comfortable victory in the Youths Hill Race, but in a battle for second place Gianni Epifani just missed-out by one second to Jason Boothroyd of East Cheshire Harriers.

Other Hill Race victories went to Adam Harrison (East Cheshire) who scored a fairly comfortable win in the Boys tace; Victoria Jones (Neston) who was well clear of her rivals in the Junior Ladies class; Mark Morris (East Cheshire) who scored a narrow victory in the Colts section; and local girl Victoria Jagger of Northern A.C. who took the honours in the Girls race.

In the last five miles Brent s h o w e d j u s t h o w determined he was to clinch victory, forcing the pace to open a seven minute winning margin by the finish at Bradda Glen.

Jack Maitland came home second — as last year — with Andy Schofield getting the better of Pete Irwin to record his highest placing in the Marathon. Best local was Tony Varley in an excellent fifth place, with Englishman Martin Hudson sixth and first veteran.

Peter Browning of Clayton finished an impressive seventh to take the newcomers award, and, along with Andrew Howarth and Martin Clark,

Winner of the "Woman -of-the-Festival" award was Lucy Elliott of Liverpool University who won the Peel Hill Race, and finished in second place in both the Good Friday and the Easter Sunday Road Races, while Stephanie Ouirk finished in second spot (second at Peel; plus fourth and fifth in Douglas), and also won the special trophy for the "Manx Woman of the Festival".

The "Veteran of the Festival" award went to 41 year old Dennis Shannon of Tinryland A.C..

Despite the threat of the Seamen's strike, most of the competitors who had entered for the Athletic Festival decided to travel to the Island and sample the delights of what is now recognised as one of the best sporting weekends on the British Athletic Calendar.

Irish Victory

The festival opened on Good Friday with a series of Road Races around the streets of Douglas, with Graham Clarke involved in a titanic battle for honours in the five mile senior event, with Pat Corcoran (Tinryland A.C. — Ireland), Pete Mayo (Lancaster University), and Scotsman Bobby Quinn of Paisley Harriers.

Victory finally went to the 32 year old Irishman, who on his first visit to the Island was highly-delighted with his success, covering the course in 25 minutes 33 seconds, with Graham taking second place after leading the race until the final 200 yards. Such was the intensity of this race for victory that only eight seconds covered the first four finishers.

In the supporting races it was Olympic 1500 metres finalist Lynne McIntyre of Paisley Harriers who dominated the Ladies Five Mile event, while John Cookson of East Cheshire Harriers scored a narrow victory over team-mate Clive Bonnelli in the 3 mile Youths class.

First local home in the Ladies race was Stephanie Quirk who finished an excellent fourth, while the local challenge in the Youths event was spearheaded by Gianni Epifani who finished a brilliant third, just 11 seconds behind class winner Cookson.

It was all-change on leg three, with Glasgow/Paisley handing over a slight lead to Bobby Quinn on the final lap, with Leeds University and Salford very close behind, while Dave Newton had dropped the Manx A.C. back to fourth.

On a dramatic final leg, Graham Clarke closed the gap on the second and third teams, but was unable to better his position, and had to be satisfied with an excellent fourth spot, with a lap time of 14 minutes 35 seconds, the third best of the day.



If there was a medal for services, above and beyond thu call of duty, he certainly deserved it!




Howarth and Martin Clark,
